- The second session focuses on the impact of new tax law on divorce and child support—and issues recently addressed in new GA legislation of which a key part was enacted for imputed income. Although not revised this year, multiple worksheets and day care off worksheet are key issues and covered in Friday's seminar.

A little more detail about each session follows along with the agenda for each that follows.

Session 1: Thursday Afternoon Session

This seminar on child support deviation strategies has been updated. This course still includes a foundation for learning the Income Shares methodology. Emphasis is on procedure to ensure passing muster with the Court.

Updates include: tips and documents to improve handling daily office work related to child support cases, recent appellate opinions, and expanded materials on underlying assumptions of the guidelines. As always, a broad range of deviation strategies are covered—including for high income cases. Materials are useful for custodial and noncustodial parents. Very new additions to the seminar include imputed income issues and parenting time deviation approaches used by other states for guidance in Georgia.

This seminar condenses key issues on making sure you comply with procedures for deviating. Then the focus shifts to how to quickly build analysis and exhibits for your Word documents for court room arguments. The seminar shows you how to quickly become comfortable using the seminar's Excel software for deviation exhibits. Strengthen your arguments and give the judge a place to hang his or her hat.

Can you readily explain what your deviation amounts are based upon?

When your client provides last minute updated information for the child support worksheet or financial affidavit, can you instantly rework not just the financial affidavit but your deviation exhibits?

What stands out about this seminar is that the strategies are documented—with underlying studies, statutes and case law from Georgia and other states, and apply rational methodologies.

Economist and expert witness R. Mark Rogers shares his experience from working with clients in Georgia and over twenty other states nationally on economic issues of child support and alimony.

Session 2: Friday Afternoon Session

The Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 made dramatic changes to tax law which significantly impact families with children. These changes have already taken effect in 2018 and make a major difference in the cost of raising children. Although child dependency exemptions have disappeared, child tax credits are up sharply, along with standard deductions. This shift in the burden of child costs is not taken into account presumptively in child support awards.

The new law also reverses how payment and receipt of alimony is treated as income tax deductions. Starting with divorces taking place in 2019, the payor is no longer allowed to treat alimony payments as a tax deduction and the recipient no longer pays income tax on alimony received. New tax code affects the application of the “needs and ability to pay” standard for determining alimony.

Recent appellate opinion has spotlighted the presumptive requirement of submitting multiple child support worksheets when more than one child is involved in child support determination. Submitting multiple worksheets for a child support case clearly makes life more difficult for the parties involved, the attorneys, and the court. This seminar covers ways to simplify the daily process of preparation by attorneys or staff as well as problems that are typical in preparation of worksheets. Following procedure is always a critical issue—especially if there is potential for appeal. There will be emphasis on procedures as outlined in code and appellate opinion.

Also due to increased interest in the issue and legislation possibly being submitted by the Georgia Commission on Child Support, moving child care off the worksheet also is discussed. This includes how a presumptive add-on can be moved to off worksheet with current guideline procedure and not waiting on new legislation.

The seminar additionally includes:

- The CLE manual has been revised substantially to address new GA code and federal income tax code. Even if you cannot attend, obtaining new materials is a must.
- Key documents on new tax code.
- Case law from Georgia and other states on issues involving child-related tax benefits.
- Appellate opinion from Georgia on multiple worksheet issues.
